Siblings in Christ,

I often do my daily devotionals with the scripture readings from the Revised Common Lectionary and one of the verses from the reading today jumped out at me. It's from Hebrews 13:7: "Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith." When I read that verse my mind was flooded with the faces and names of the many people that have led me spiritually throughout my life—youth pastors and pastors, old Sunday School teachers, college chaplains and friends, people that walked with me for a season in no official capacity, some who led more with the way they lived more than their sage advice or words of wisdom. This verse was asking me to consider them, recall how their faithfulness worked out for them, and to imitate them.

Imitation, they say, is the highest form of flattery, but could it also be a way of the spirit. We look to Jesus first and foremost, of course (Hebrews says that too!), but I never saw Jesus after a bad day at school or after a hard family reunion. But, for some of these others I have and they have shown me in closer detail what it might look like to walk as a faithful disciple through those experiences. That word "leader" can sound so official, so positionally-oriented, so hierarchical even that we forget sometimes that, at its root, it just means someone who takes their steps before you, whom you walk behind, perhaps, looking for the best places to set your feet. It occurred to me what a powerful theme this is through Hebrews, as we've been noticing in August as we've read closely through Hebrews 11. It also reminded me of something very similar that the apostle Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 11:1: "Be imitators of me, as I am of Christ."

Could it be that one of the great graces of being church together is having a community of people to imitate—an ever-expanding array of lived examples of where Christ's life has been tried in real world circumstances? If imitation is part of the process then being church must mean being nearer together, being in closer conversation, opening up our lives and our challenges and our stories, right? Imitation requires proximity and enough insight to know whether and how our experiences might apply. The richness and variation of those examples expand and deepen with

Mission at MUMC

A small group of MUMC folks met on August 11 to discuss the future of mission work at MUMC and one of the things we discussed was how many newer people knew what some of our mission work was. Below is an explanation of the things we talked about continuing and what that involvement means.

Share: Share is the area food pantry but it also connects those in need to a free monthly supper, Christmas and Thanksgiving Baskets, Christmas gifts for kids and families that includes warm clothing, back to school items, connections to state and federal programs, and other support as it is able. MUMC supports the monthly suppers by making desserts and food and serving; the back to school collections by donating items; the pantry through monetary donation and food items; and the Christmas donations by adopting a family or families.

Crop Walk: CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by local congregations or groups to raise funds to end hunger at home and around the world. MUMC supports this by encouraging our families to commit to participating in the walk and asking for sponsors to pledges dollars for their efforts. Any one is able to sponsor a walker even if they cannot physically make the walk.

Youth Mission: Our youth with the leadership of Tom Knapp, join up with Group Work Camps, an international, ecumenical, volunteer, Christian youth mission trip organization that brings together youth (ages 10–20) and adults (ages 21+), usually representing individual church youth groups, for week-long summer work camps, in which participants repair or renovate homes in various communities throughout the world, especially in the United States, Canada, and parts of Latin America and South America. The communities in which the work camps are held are often in economically deprived areas, or areas which have been especially hard-hit by natural disasters, includ-

ing flooding or hurricanes.

Adult Missions: Participation in adult mission trips has not been happening since the pandemic but there is a lot of excitement around expanding and making this team a more local team of adults that can be in mission (the physical, hands on, hammer and nail stuff) in a variety of ways. MUMC might, for example, receive a call for help to move an air conditioner, or hang some curtains, and send out a request for a volunteer to answer the call, or it might answer the call for help building an access ramp for a handicapped person. This is not a dream as we have worked in this capacity before as the BAT Team but we need to decide how to revitalize this through our church family.

Salvation Army Bell Ringing: The sound of bells ringing can be heard in front of department stores and grocery stores alike signaling a time for open-handed generosity. The program began decades ago by a Salvation Army officer "just trying to raise money for his Corp to take care of social service programs.

MUMC has been involved with ringing for a number of years and as of the past few years our involvement has been shared with other area churches but a portion of the proceeds stay right herein the Milford area and, in fact are distributed following Salvation Army Guidelines, by our pastor. A coordinator for this effort will determine our future with this mission.

Those at the meeting also talked about renewing commitments with places like Family Promise of Southern NH (its mission is to end homelessness one family at a time), Habitat for Humanity (who seek to put God's love into action, by bringing people together to build homes, communities and hope), and looking to understand better ways to use our building for the asset it is.

One of the celebrations we noted over the last year was the spontaneous mission we witnessed with the group of folks who wanted to do something about the war in the Ukraine and decided to quilt pins in Ukrainian colors that they sold to raise over \$1500 for Ukraine Relief. Have you got a spontaneous idea? Did you miss our first meeting? Stay tuned for the next one on October20th. Time TBD.

The Christmas Fair will go on as usual this year thanks to team of people who want t see it happen.


